

INSTRUCTIONAL TECHNOLOGY TECHNICIAN VSC UP – PAT - BARGAINING UNIT

GRADE 10 Non-Exempt

BASIC FUNCTION:

To support faculty and staff in the use of instructional and presentation technologies and software; to assist faculty in integrating audio-visual technology into classrooms using PCs and multimedia equipment; and to assist in design, set up and maintenance of instructional facilities and classrooms.

CHARACTERISTIC DUTIES & RESPONSIBILITIES

- Oversee and manage audio-visual services, including scheduling and facilitating equipment sign out and return; maintain and update equipment inventory; set up equipment in classrooms and provide instruction as needed.
- Implement, manage and maintain instructional technology resources, including assessing and advising on technologies appropriate to supporting teaching and learning in a college environment.
- Provide training in of the use of audio-visual and presentation technology in the classroom environment.
- Develop and administer media service operating policies and procedures.
- Maintain and provide routine repairs of equipment, obtain outside service as needed for major repairs; consult outside providers on service agreements.
- Hire, train and supervise student assistants.
- Keep abreast of current developments and trends in instructional technologies.
- Advise management on budget recommendations for and acquisition of audio-visual equipment and related technology.
- Perform other related duties as assigned.

SUPERVISION RECEIVED

Direct supervision is received from the Assistant Chief Technology Officer.

MINIMUM QUALIFICATIONS

Qualifications include a bachelor's degree in educational or instructional technology, plus two to four years of relevant experience, in a Windows

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networked environment, or a combination of education experience from which comparable knowledge and skills are required. Expert knowledge in the use of a wide array of technology products, including multimedia and web writing tools, imaging and video software, authoring tools and information retrieval using the Internet is essential.
