I. INTRODUCTION

The Vermont State Colleges (VSC) is a public corporation established by Vermont State Statute in 1961, VSA 16, Chapter 72. VSC consists of the senior institutions: (1) Castleton State College (CSC), (2) Johnson State College (JSC), (3) Lyndon State College (LSC), which offer academic degrees ranging from the Associate degree to the Masters degree, and two two-year institutions: (1) The Community College of Vermont (CCV) and, (2) Vermont Technical College (VTC), offering the Associate degree exclusively. Figure 1 (p.4) illustrates the campus centers for each college as well as the instructional sites served by each.

This Fact Book highlights important characteristics of each institution as well as the major educational activities of VSC as a system. All numbers listed are as of Fall, 1978.



The Community College of Vermont is not listed in the above table since it grants degrees based on a learning contract with each student and the attainment of ten required competencies. In effect, CCV degree programs are tailored to fit the individual students' needs. Over fifty Associate degrees were granted by CCV in the 1977-78 academic year.

External Degree Program

The External Degree Program is an upper division program designed specifically for adult learners. It has been created to provide education to adults for whom an off-campus individualized instruction pattern would be the most effective. It is offered through the use of the facilities, resources and personnel of existing institutions. To be eligible for admission students

must have an Associate Degree or have completed sixty college credits. The program is available at Castleton State College, Johnson State College and was previously offered at Windham College. Enrollment data appears below:

Assessment of Prior Learning Program

The Assessment of Prior Learning Program has been developed to grant credit to students for the documentation and evaluation of experientially acquired college-level learning. The award of credit is based on a portfolio of prior learning containing documentation which substantiates the credit request. The process of portfolio preparation is accomplished in a course entitled "Educational Assessment and Portfolio Preparation" taught by adjunct faculty. This course is offered at Castleton, Johnson, Lyndon, Community College of Vermont and the Vermont Institute of Community Involvement. Windham College also sponsored the course. Enrollment data appears below.

VI. SPECIAL SERVICES

In addition to providing traditional classroom instruction, VSC institutions serve Vermonters with a variety of educational offerings both on-campus and off. The activities identified below are examples of offerings available and do not cover the full range of activites that occur.

A. Castleton State College

Off-Campus Sites

-located in rental space in Middlebury and Rutland
-principally used as classroom space for regular Castleton course offerings
 -also used for non-credit courses offered by Castleton
-available for use by community advisory groups, local schools and agencies for certain functions.

2. Continuing Education

-courses are offered in degree programs for evening students
-courses are also offered to meet personal enrichment needs of Vermonters
-courses meet on campus and at off-campus locations throughout Southern Vermont
-800 persons enrolled in courses in 13 different locations in the Fall of 1978
-in the past year courses have been offered in Brattleboro, Bennington, Arlington, Marlboro, Wilmington, Manchester, Bellows Falls, Brownsville, Springfield, Chester, Brandon, White River Junction, Woodstock, Londonderry, Wells and Vergennes.

3. Brown Bag Seminars

-regularly scheduled no-cost noontime activities offered in Middlebury and Rutland for the general public
-topics are directed towards the interest of the industrial and commercial employees of the region
-a brown bag lunch is provided with a 40 minute presentation followed by a question and answer period
-speakers are generally volunteer, upper level officials from around the state.

B. <u>Johnson State College</u>

1. Continuing Education

-the External Degree Program is offered through this program
-group meetings and/or courses for the External Degree Program are held in Montpelier, Waterbury, Johnson, Lyndonville, Newport, and Wells River
-other continuing education courses are offered at the Green Mountain Valley School in Moretown
-graduate courses are offered in the evening for in-service teachers.

2. Conferences/Institute Program

-primary objective is to maximize the facility and faculty resources
-established to respond to the needs of individuals and groups for educational services
-has accommodated Girls' State for the past four years
-will host a Composers' Conference this summer which will attract 12 to 15 professional and amateur composers; 6 or 8 concerts featuring music arranged by the composers attending the conference will be offered free to the public

3. The Learning Place

-located in Johnson, Vermont
-provides diagnostic and remedial services to children referred by parents or school district
-remedial programs for children with learning problems are coordinated with public school personnel in the counties of Washington, Lamoille and Orleans.

C. Lyndon State College

1. Emergency Services Program

-provides ambulatory service to Lyndonville and 7 surrounding communities.
-staffed by 30 volunteer students 17 of which hold Vermont Medical Technician Certificates; the remainder are qualified in advanced first aid and CPR.
-on duty 24 hours per day and respond to approximately 300 calls per year.

2. <u>Community Service</u>, <u>Cultural and Recreation Programs</u>

-programs are offered for Vermonters to explore their interests or for entertainment.
-examples include; the College Lecture Series, The Kingdom Concert Series; Varsity Athletic Programs, Theatre Producations, the Catamount Film Series and the Health Series.

3. Rural Industrial Education Program

-developed to provide educational opportunities for industrial employees
-representatives from Northeast Kingdom industries and higher educationplan and implement work-related college level training on site in factories, hospitals and other facilities
-industrial employees are being trained to become instructors
-specific curriculums are being designed to meet the needs of the worker/ students.

D. Vermont Technical College

VTC hosts a variety of activities on campus for community persons and groups. Examples of events occurring at VTC are as follows:

-state cattle, sheep, and goat breeding associations often meet at VTC
-annual statewide soils judging contest is held at VTC
- \ldots .FFA and FHA state meetings are often held at VTC
-facilities are used by state associations or agencies for seminars in areas such as water treatment, wastewater treatment, surveying and energy.

E. Community College of Vermont

The Community College of Vermont is a highly dispersed educational system with offices located in 16 towns throughout Vermont. It is an institution which offers a combination of individualized coursework for students pursuing an Associate Degree, recreational courses for lifelong learners and educational courses for individuals interested in improving their career skills.

In addition to instructional activities, CCV serves Vermonters in many other ways. For example, many CCV sites serve as referral agencies. Oftentimes prospective students, or persons from the community, come into a CCV office and, after meeting with a counselor,

are referred to other educational or state organizations. Generally this occurs when it becomes evident that CCV cannot meet the needs or interests of the individual.

A sample of other CCV community service activities follows:

1. Central Vermont Region

-co-sponsored a Small Business Fair designed to be informative to prospective entrepreneurs and educational to people already in business
-in cooperation with the Barre Police Department, conducted a one-day workshop on bad checks, shoplifting, and building security
-conducted a two-day workshop in cooperation with Montpelier radio station WNCS-FM on Preparing News Releases and Public Service Announcements
-regularly offers free workshops on Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation
 Training
-hosted a series of six workshops in cooperation with the Waterbury Public Health Association on Home Health Care designed to instruct individuals on home care of the sick and elderly.

2. Northeast Kingdom Region

-conducted free workshops on Alcohol and Drug Abuse in cooperation with the Drop-in Center of the Vermont Council on Alcohol and Drug Abuse
-co-sponsored with the St. Johnsbury Chamber of Commerce a Tax Credit Seminar for Small Businesses designed to assist business in claiming credits for the Vermont and Federal energy conservation and alternative energy systems measures
-offered a free Tax Preparation Workshop to assist taxpayers in the preparation of their tax returns
-offered a free Resume Writing and Job Application Workshop designed to assist Vermonters in preparation of their resumes and in completion of job applications
-offered a free workshop on Emergency Snowmobile Repair in conjunction with Polaris dealers in Newport, Hardwick and Lyndonville.

Northwest Region

....participates in and provides staff for the Adult Education Council which attempts to eliminate/minimize program duplication and to maximize course offering information for the public; the Council's

- membership consists of area representatives from community education and community service agencies, as well as local citizens
-co-planned or co-sponsored workshops in areas such as Home Health Aide Training in cooperation with State Social and Rehabilitative Services, Woodlot Mangement in cooperation with the Department of Forests and Parks, and Farm Management in cooperation with the Agricultural Extension Service.
-offers a "Classics" Film Series/Course for students which is also available to the public for a small fee; a local movie theatre is cooperating in this venture
-coordinated workshops in Small Business Management including such topics as check-bouncing, shoplifting, and tax preparation and workshops on job-hunting in cooperation with the Department of Employment Security
-approximately \$1500 worth of books per year are provided area libraries to supplement their collections and to assure reference availability for CCV students.

4. <u>Southeast Region</u>

-offered a pre-retirement seminar for local industrial, commercial and community persons
-conducted a free Energy Workshop designed to examine alternate sources of energy and to discuss public utilities
-trained senior citizens how to listen to children so that they may become volunteer workers for the area public schools.
-currently providing leadership for the formation of an educational consortium consisting of UVM, CSC and other educational providers for service to Southeastern Vermont.
