

I. INTRODUCTION

The Vermont State Colleges (VSC) is a public corporation established by Vermont State Statute in 1961, 16 V.S.A., Chapter 72. Three senior institutions, Castleton State College (CSC), Johnson State College (JSC), and Lyndon State College (LSC) offer programs leading to degrees at three levels: Associate, Bachelors and Masters. Two two-year institutions, the Community College of Vermont (CCV) and Vermont Technical College (VTC), offer the Associate degree exclusively. Figure 1 (page 4) illustrates the main campus locations for each college as well as major additional sites through which extended services are offered.

This <u>Fact Book</u> highlights important characteristics of each institution as well as the major educational activities of VSC as a system. Except where noted, all numbers listed are as of Fall, 1984 and all financial data are from the FY1985 budget.



ASSESSMENT OF PRIOR LEARNING PROGRAM

The Assessment of Prior Learning Program was developed to evaluate for credit fully documented experientially acquired college-level learning. The award of credit is based on a portfolio of prior learning containing documentation which substantiates the credit request. The process of portfolio preparation is accomplished in a course entitled "Educational Assessment and Portfolio Preparation." This course is offered at Castleton, Johnson, Lyndon, Community College of Vermont and Burlington College. Enrollment data appear below.

This section of the $\frac{Fact\ Book}{Students}$ contains information concerning the number and types of $\frac{Fact\ Book}{Students}$ attending the Vermont State Colleges. The following definitions apply to this information.

- a) <u>Headcount</u> The actual number of students enrolled in coursework at a college.
- b) Part-Time (PT) An undergraduate student enrolled for fewer than 12 credit hours of coursework in a semester, or a graduate student enrolled for fewer than 9 credit hours of coursework.
- c) Full-Time (FT) An undergraduate student enrolled for 12 or more credit hours of coursework in a semester, or a graduate student enrolled for 9 or more credit hours of coursework.
- d) <u>Full-Time Equivalent</u> (FTE) For undergraduates, total credit hours taken by students divided by 15. For graduate students, total credit hours taken by students divided by 12.



HEADCOUNT ENROLLMENT IN NEBHE PROGRAM

Out -of-State figures for 1984 include 329 NEBHE students. NEBHE stands for the New England Board of Higher Education. NEBHE coordinates a program which allows students from a participating New England state to enroll in academic programs at VSC not offered at their state institutions at tuition rates 125% of the Vermont resident tuition charge. Reported below are the numbers of out-of-state students attending VSC institutions under this program. The breakdown is as follows:



VI. STUDENT FINANCIAL AID INFORMATION

Financial Aid has become increasingly important in helping students meet expenses. The following tables present actual financial aid disbursements for 1984-85 by college and type of aid. Financial aid consists of grants (or scholarships) to students which are not repaid, wages for work performed through a college program, and loans to students which must be repaid with interest.

Each college maintains a financial aid office to advise students, to evaluate applications, and manage programs under college control. In order to qualify for financial aid, family financial resources must be shown to be inadequate to meet college expenses.

The following Federal and State programs contribute over 98 percent of all the financial aid received by VSC students.

A. <u>Federal Programs</u>:

- 1. Pell Grants. Grants from Federal funds to students with family incomes below a Federally established cut-off point; formerly known as Basic Education Opportunity Grants. Pell Grants range from \$250 to \$1900 per year.
- 2. Supplemental Education Opportunity Grants (SEOG). Grants of Federal funds administered by the college for students of exceptional need. SEOG grants range from \$200 to \$2000 per year.
- 3. <u>College Work-Study</u>. Wages paid students working for the college or public or private non-profit agencies. Work Study is funded 80% from Federal funds and 20% from college funds.
- 4. <u>Guaranteed Student Loans</u>. Loans from private lenders at 7%, 8% or 9% interest to students qualifying according to Federal guidelines. The Federal Government pays the interest on the loan while the student is in school. and guarantees repayment. Up to \$2500 may be borrowed each year. Each state designates an organization to review and approve applications. In Vermont, the Vermont Student Assistance Corporation (VSAC) serves this function.
- 5. National Direct Student Loans (NDSL). A loan program administered by colleges and originally funded by the Federal government. Though there are no longer Federal capital contributions, loans continue to be made using the proceeds from payments of interest and principal by earlier borrowers.
- 6. Nursing Loans. Similar to NDSL, these loans were established with Federal capital contributions, are restricted to students studying nursing, and currently do not receive additional Federal funding. They are administered by colleges.

B. State Programs:

- 1. <u>VSAC Grants</u>. Grants awarded by the Vermont Student Assistance Corporation to Vermont residents. VSAC grants are funded from State appropriations and range from \$300 to \$2400.
- 2. <u>Home State Grants</u>. These are grants made to non-Vermont students who are attending a Vermont State College by their home states.

Less than two percent of VSC student financial aid is provided by VSC and private grants. VSC grants include endowed scholarship funds established at the colleges by individuals and corporations as well as gifts to the colleges for student financial aid. Private grants consist of scholarships awarded directly to VSC students by service clubs, foundations and corporations.


VSC PERCENTAGE DISTRIBUTION



VIII. VSC LIBRARY DEVELOPMENT PROJECT

A five-year plan to remove serious deficiencies in Library and Information services in the Vermont State Colleges was endorsed by the VSC Board of Trustees in August 1984. Public and private support is being sought for the project which is based on two years of study and analysis. In implementing the plan, VSC seeks to:

- build appropriate information competency and library use into VSC general education and degree programs;
- provide library/information services to those not studying on a campus---one-third of VSC students;
- provide reference librarians for help and instruction, in the libraries and for students not studying on a campus;
- add 15,000 volumes per year to VSC holdings to bring collections up to levels adequate to support VSC degree programs;
- keep collections current by reducing the replacement cycle for books from 32 years to 18 years; and,
- automate to create a single, computerized catalog making all VSC holdings available to all VSC students and faculty, whether on a campus or not.
