#### I. <u>COLLEGE INFORMATION</u>

The Vermont State Colleges (VSC) is a public corporation established by Vermont State Statutes in 1961, 16 V.S.A., Chapter 72. Three senior institutions, Castleton State College (CSC), Johnson State College (JSC), and Lyndon State College (LSC) offer programs leading to degrees at three levels: Associate, Bachelors and Masters. The two-year institutions, Community College of Vermont (CCV) and Vermont Technical College (VTC), offer the Associate degree exclusively. The map on the back cover illustrates the locations for each campus and the major sites through which services are offered.

This <u>Fact Book</u> highlights important characteristics of each institution as well as the major educational activities of the VSC as a system. Except where noted, all numbers listed are as of Fall 1992.

#### ASSESSMENT OF PRIOR LEARNING PROGRAM

The Assessment of Prior Learning Program evaluates experientially-acquired, college-level learning for college credit. The award is based on a portfolio of prior learning containing documentation which substantiates the credit request. The process of portfolio preparation is accomplished in a course entitled "Educational Assessment and Portfolio Preparation." This course is offered at Castleton, Johnson and Lyndon State Colleges, Burlington College, and the twelve CCV sites throughout the state each year. Enrollment data appear below.

- d) <u>Full-time Equivalent</u> (FTE) For undergraduates, total student credit hours divided by 15. For graduate students, total student credit hours divided by 12.





#### V. STUDENT FINANCIAL AID INFORMATION

Financial aid has become increasingly important in helping students meet their college expenses. Financial aid consists of grants or scholarships which do not have to be paid back; wages for work performed through a college program; and loans which must be paid back with interest.

Each college maintains a financial aid office to advise students, to evaluate applications, and to manage federal, state, and institutional aid programs. In order to qualify for financial aid, a student must be considered to have financial need.

College costs - student and/or family contribution = Financial need

Federal and state financial aid programs contribute over 94 percent of all financial aid received by VSC students. The following information includes actual financial aid disbursements and expenditures for the 1991-92 college year.

#### A. Federal Programs

#### 1. Pell Grants

Grants from federal funds, with eligibility determined by a standard formula passed into law by Congress, given to students with low family incomes. For 1991-92 Pell grants ranged from \$195 to \$2,400 per year.

#### 2. Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grants (SEOG)

Grants from federal funds, administered by the College, for students with exceptional financial need. Priority is given to Pell grant recipients. SEOG grants in FY92 ranged from \$100 to \$4,000 per year. SEOG grants were funded 85% from federal dollars and 15% from college dollars in 1991-92.

#### 3. College Workstudy (CWSP)

Wages paid to students working for the college either on-campus or off-campus. Students may also work for a private or public non-profit organization, or a local, state, or federal agency. For 1991-92, the Federal share remained at 70% and the college share at 30%.

#### 4. Perkins Loans

A revolving, low-interest (5 percent), federally-subsidized loan program administered by the college. Loan amounts vary depending on the student's year in school and on the amount of loan funds received by the school.

#### 5. Nursing Loans

A revolving, low-interest (5 percent) loan program administered by the college. Loan amounts vary depending on the amount of loan funds received by the school. Students must be enrolled in a Health Professions Program.

#### 6. Stafford Loans

Low-interest (8%), federally-subsidized loans obtained from a lender such as a bank or credit union, insured by a guarantee agency, and made to students with documented financial need. Loan amounts vary. The maximum is \$2,625 for each of the first two years of school and \$4,000 for each remaining year. The maximum total Stafford Student Loan debt for an undergraduate is \$17,250.

#### 7. PLUS and SLS Loans

Loans with variable interest rates, adjusted each year, provide additional funds for educational expenses and, like Stafford Loans, are made by a lender such as a bank or credit union.

PLUS loans (Parent Loans for Undergraduate Students) are limited to parent borrowers who need to borrow additional funds to help pay for their children's education.

SLS loans (Supplemental Loans for Students) are for graduate, professional or independent undergraduate students who need to borrow additional funds for educational expenses.

There is a \$4,000 limit per student per year on both types of loans. Each loan has a variable interest rate.

#### B. State Programs

#### 1. In-State

Grants awarded by the State of Vermont through Vermont Student Assistance Corporation to Vermont students. These grants are funded from annual state appropriations and for FY1992 ranged from \$75 to \$3,300. For full-time students, the amount of the grant is determined by subtracting the Pell grant, if any, and the calculated family contribution from the maximum allowable grant of \$3,300.


#### 2. Out-of-State

Grants awarded by some other states to their residents who attend a Vermont state college. Amounts vary depending on each state's criteria.

#### C. <u>Institutional/Private Programs</u>

Less than six percent of all financial aid awarded to VSC students is provided by VSC and private grants. VSC grants include endowed scholarship funds, as well as gifts to the colleges for financial aid. Private grants are awarded directly to VSC students by service clubs, foundations, and organizations.







With the support of the Vermont General Assembly, the Vermont State Colleges established the Southern Vermont Education Center in Springfield in January 1989. The purpose of the Center is to coordinate and deliver to the region higher education programs sponsored by the five VSC institutions, as well as other public and private institutions. The priority is on programs for adult learners and career and employment-related educational services.

Almost half of the individuals served through the Center participate in employer-based training programs such as marketing workshops, supervisory training, and customer service training. A large number enroll in courses for professional and graduate education, and baccalaureate education. Additionally, many residents of the region participate in non-credit courses, workshops, and meetings at the Center, many offered at the studio/classroom of Vermont Interactive Television which is located at the Center.

In the Fall of 1992 service was extended to Windham County. In collaboration with Vermont Interactive Television, programs and services are now available in Brattleboro at the Vermont Agicultural Business Education Center.

#### B. <u>VERMONT INTERACTIVE TELEVISION</u>

Vermont Interactive Television (VIT) is a two-way audio and video distance learning and videoconferencing system. As of January 1993, VIT will be operating in nine communities around the state (Bennington, Brattleboro, Newport, Randolph Center, Rutland, St. Johnsbury, South Burlington, Springfield, and Waterbury).

The purpose of VIT is to extend educational and training programs to underserved areas of the state, and to enhance communications for many educational, business, and government organizations. VIT provides a cost-effective way for state agencies, businesses and other statewide organizations to conduct business and disseminate information. VIT is also used to hold public hearings statewide.

VIT has been developed and funded by a partnership of local, state and federal funds and the collaborative efforts of education, government, and business. VIT also generates revenues via the hourly rates it charges users of the system. At the State's request, VIT is managed by the Vermont State Colleges, and is overseen by a seven-member Coordinating Council appointed by the Governor.

During FY 1992, over 4,000 people attended courses, seminars, training sessions and meetings held on VIT. Over 350 businesses sent employees to attend education and training programs at VIT studios around the state. Close to 2,000 hours of programming occured during 1992.



#### C. SMALL BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT CENTER


The purpose of the Vermont Small Business Development Center (SBDC) is to improve the economic climate in Vermont through the promotion and development of small businesses, and by providing management assistance to Vermont's small business persons. The Vermont State Colleges became the host organization for the SBDC in October of 1992.

The SBDC Director's office is located at Vermont Technical College. Four area specialists are located in regional development corporation offices in Burlington, Rutland, Springfield, and St. Johnsbury and provide SBDC assistance in all regions of the state. The SBDC is primarily funded through a major grant from the federal Small Business Administration.
