Dear Chancellor Spaulding:

I am writing to request the awarding of "President Emerita" of Lyndon State College to Dr. Peggy Ryan Williams. In 2006, the Faculty Assembly supported this recommendation. When the recommendation came before the Priorities Committee in February 2007, the Committee declined to forward the nomination to the full Board stating that the six criteria in Policy 204 were not met.

The six criteria in Policy 204 include:

- At least 10 years of full-time employment with the Vermont State Colleges;
- Clear evidence of outstanding teaching and/or administrative services;
- Recognized record of professional achievement, growth, and development;
- Clear evidence of college service beyond the normal or ordinary expectations;
- Prospects for continuing service to the Vermont State Colleges; and
- Retired status.

It is my understanding that Peggy served the VSC as a full-time administrator for 20 years (CCV, Chancellor's Office, Lyndon State College). Clear evidence of outstanding administrative services can be found in the attached Curriculum Vitae. These include the Peggy Williams Leadership Award from Lyndon State and the Jackie Gribbons Award for Leadership (Vermont Women in Higher Education), among many others. Peggy's recognized record of professional achievement, growth and development can be demonstrated by her receipt of two graduate degrees (M.A. – UVM, 1976 and Ed.D. – Harvard University, 1983), her board service, and her presidency of Ithaca College (1997-2008). Clear evidence of college service beyond the normal or ordinary expectations includes her service on 21 Boards of Directors of not-for-profit and for-profit organizations.

I can personally attest to the benefit of Peggy's continuing service to the Vermont State Colleges System as she has provided voluntary assistance to my predecessor and frequently provided me with advice and counsel. Dr. Williams is enormously generous in sharing her knowledge and experience. Finally, it is important to note that Peggy is now retired.

Given the past (see attached letter) and current recommendations received from the Faculty Assemblies of Lyndon State College and Northern Vermont University-Lyndon (unanimous endorsement received at December 4, 2018, Assembly meeting), I request a re-visitation of the February 2007 decision given Peggy's current retired status.



By this letter, the Faculty Assembly of Lyndon State College recommends the award of emeritus status to Dr. Margaret R. Williams, president of LSC from 1989 to 1997. Such recognition would acknowledge both the excellence of President Williams' tenure at LSC and her continuing commitment to and support of the college.

During the eight years that Peggy Williams served as president at Lyndon, her accomplishments were many and significant, from overseeing the addition of new academic programs in Mathematics, Liberal Studies, and Sports Medicine to increasing the visibility of the college and raising enrollments to record levels that have been matched and exceeded only in recent years. Peggy also established strong and valuable working relationships with and enhanced the sense of community among all constituencies within and beyond the college: faculty, staff, students, alumni, friends, and the community at large. She established the division of Institutional Advancement and laid the foundations for significant advances in recruitment, admissions, and retention. She also found the funds to "wire" the campus and connect us to the electronic world then in its infancy, establishing and then developing the campus network and technology infrastructure upon which we are now so dependent. But perhaps the most visible mark of Peggy's tenure at LSC is the Samuel Read Hall Library and Academic Center, built upon the foundation of the original Samuel Read Hall Library. The construction of "LAC" provided much needed and substantial updating and expansion of library facilities and additional academic space. But LAC also serves as an excellent metaphor for all of Peggy's contributions at LSC: building upon the existing strengths of the college and preparing for the future.

Beyond her contributions to LSC during her tenure as president, Peggy has maintained a connection to and support of the college that are exemplary. The endowed scholarship that bears her name and supports female students who exhibit leadership in town, community and school is only the most obvious of her contributions. She is also a lead contributor to the Doyle Scholarship Fund and a continuing benefactor of the college in general. Moreover, she continues to participate in college events and to maintain her connections with Lyndon colleagues, acting as friend and mentor to many.

Her many substantial contributions to LSC as president and her continuing support of and contributions to LSC, not to mention her role as president of Ithaca College, make Peggy Williams a valuable and valued friend of the college. The merit and value of everything that she has done and continues to do for the college make her a superb candidate for the award of emeritus status.

Dear Jeb,

In May 2017, Professor Joyce Thomas retired from Castleton University as a much acclaimed, much admired professor of English. She exemplified the ideal scholarly life, principally by her resolute commitment to teaching, scholarship, and service—a commitment that, over thirty-seven years, helped to advance the reputation of the English Department and the university.

It is therefore with great pleasure that I submit this letter, trusting that you will find herein abundant evidence to conclude—as has our English Department—that the Vermont State Colleges Board of Trustees should consider granting Professor Thomas emeritus status.

Teaching

During her career, Professor Thomas taught more than thirty-five discrete courses from across the English Department curriculum, including Mythology, Folk Tales, Lyric Poetry, Epic Poetry, Greek Tragedy, Shakespeare's Tragedies, and Art of Children's Book Illustration. Governed by expert design and infused with high seriousness, her classes animated both creative and critical thought among her students. Professor Thomas herself provides a brief but telling example of such synthesis: "One assignment in Lyric Poetry ... asks students to treat the same subject by writing three different types of poetry, followed by an essay in which they discuss how the subject changes as the form for its expression changes." Here one can imagine her students better understanding their subjects as a poet might and better understanding poetry itself as a poet might—including how form and subject illuminate one another—but then, too, better understanding poetry as a literary critic might, because of the attendant discussion and explication. One can imagine, all told, her students learning about poetry, and literature, from the inside and the out.

Professor Thomas' students often announced with excited trepidation that they were enrolled in a "Joyce" class. To the uninitiated, a "Joyce" class could lead first to a heightened sense of panic—but then to a heightened sense of quickening interests—and then to a heightened sense of outright love for intellectual adventure. An excerpt from one student testimonial illustrates this point: "Throughout my time at Castleton, I have designed my academic schedule around Dr. Thomas' classes. I have done this because I know that I will learn so much from her in each of her classes. After taking seven classes with her in three years, I deeply appreciate her high standards and inspirational ways of making each literary work come alive." To many of her students, Professor Thomas represented a formidable intellect engaged in most fascinating ways by all aspects of literary study. Among those students especially, she often effected a change that was like leaving the cave and seeing the light.

Scholarship

Professor Thomas humbly yet proudly assumed the mantle of college and university poet for much of her tenure at Castleton. She was, and remains, not just a rhymer of words but a poet unflinching in her revelations yet sublimely attuned as well to the sweet, sad, humorous ironies of existence. She has published her poetry in literary journals, anthologies, and small-press magazines; she has also published two books of her poetry: *Skins* (2001) and *Washing Birds* (2016). About that latter book, poet and English Department professor emeritus Tom Smith writes: "Joyce Thomas recreates in words the curious wonder that is nature (elephants and birds, for instance), the unlikeliness of the human heart."

Besides her poetry publications, Professor Thomas has read her poetry at public poetry readings near and far for thirty-five years. Her poetry, in turn, has drawn praise from numerous literary venues, including the venerable literary magazine *North American Review*, sponsor of the annual James Hearst Poetry Prize competition, for which Professor Thomas won first place in 2005.

Furthermore, Professor Thomas was, and remains, an authority on the study of mythology, folk tales, and fairy tales. She published her book *Inside the Wolf's Belly: Aspects of the Fairy Tale* (1989) relatively early in her career and continued to publish essays about folk tales, fairy tales, and children's literature in journals and in anthologies such as *A Companion to the Fairy Tale* (2003). In addition, she regularly delivered presentations related to such scholarship at Northeast Modern Language Association conferences.

In addition, Professor Thomas served as a Humanities Scholar for the Vermont Council on the Arts & Humanities for almost twenty years; a member of the Vermont Academy of Arts & Sciences Board of Trustees for two years; a member of the Book Award Committee for the Children's Literature Association for two years; a judge for the Poetry Society of Vermont high school poetry contest for two years; and a coordinator for the Rutland Free Library writers series for two years.

Small wonder that the Vermont State Colleges Board of Trustees awarded Professor Thomas a Vermont State Colleges Faculty Fellowship in 1988 to honor her "outstanding accomplishments in teaching and learning."

Service

Professor Thomas served the English Department with steadfast dedication for almost four decades. She helped to develop department programs, curricula, and policies; to assess the department according to its stated intentions; to evaluate thousands of student placement essays and English major portfolio essays; to write meticulous letters of promotion for her faculty colleagues and letters of recommendation for recently graduated English majors; to write reports to the academic dean, the president, and the Board of Trustees; and to complete countless other tasks large and small—all of which work Professor Thomas undertook in her inimitable way: observant, inventive, impressively articulate, dauntlessly hopeful, and amusing.

Professor Thomas served the college and university beyond the English Department, too. She championed literary studies, the humanities, and the liberal arts. At one time or another, Professor Thomas served on a broad range of Faculty Assembly committees, including the Faculty Affairs Committee; the Reappointment, Promotion, and Tenure Committee; the Teaching and Scholarship Committee; the Graduate Council; and the Executive Council. She conceived the Women's Studies minor at Castleton; then designed and implemented that minor; and then helped to institute the Women's Studies Committee to oversee that minor. It is not a coincidence that in 2016, the Women's Studies Committee established the Joyce Thomas Award, presented annually for the best student essay addressing women's and gender studies. And in 2017, that same committee established the Joyce Thomas Scholarship, presented annually to the most promising student interested in women's studies.

For these many reasons, and more, I hope you will consider my recommendation that Joyce Thomas be granted emeritus status by the Vermont State Colleges Board of Trustees.

Dear Yasmine:

Castleton University wishes to relinquish the license to broadcast from radio station WIUV 91.3 FM. Castleton will continue to "broadcast" a student run radio station via the internet. Funding for the station comes from the Castleton University Student Government Association. The license is owned by the Board of Trustees for the Vermont State College System. There are currently three other licenses held by the BOT for stations at UNV-Lyndon, UNV- Johnson, and VTC.

WIUV has operated successfully since obtaining the license in 1977. The current license will expire in 2022. Through the renewal process for licensing in 2012 it was discovered that the public file had not been properly maintained and disclosed this to the FCC resulting in a Consent Decree stipulating specific sanctions and fine. All fines were paid, the sanctions carried out over four years were completed. The cost of the process approximated \$7000, most of which were fees for legal counsel. Should WIUV be found in violation in the future there could be retroactive fines and sanctions.

During the Fall semester there has been much discussion with the current leadership of the station, faculty of the Communications and Media Department, and the President's Cabinet. All are in agreement with the decision to transition to be on-line radio only under a new brand.

There are three main reasons to end broadcast. A limited leadership to run the station has resulted in a few dedicated students attempting to run the station and keep it in compliance. The Faculty of Communication and Media do not "teach" radio as they once did, nor are there plans to invigorate it as part of the curriculum. Potential fines would be the responsibility of SGA who believe the risks outweigh the benefits for broadcast.

Legal Counsel for the VSCS has mapped the pathway to relinquish the license. We seek the support of the Board of Trustees prior to doing so. Actual ending date and time is to be determined.
