
2400+ responses in 5 days = 400+ hours of input

Workforce Preparation Perceptions

- Stakeholders outside of the system are generally satisfied that students graduate from the VSCS with skills for the workforce.
- Ninety-one percent of those who responded (n=132) are either "very satisfied" (45.5%) or "somewhat satisfied" (45.5%); six percent are somewhat dissatisfied, and 3 percent are very dissatisfied.
- When asked what knowledge or skills are missing from VSCS graduates, many stakeholders referenced a need for more hands-on experience and more focus on communication skills.

affordability proximity to home small, welcoming communities


What are some reasons students do NOT choose a VSCS institution?

Charges and Recommendations



Charges: address duplication; ensure quality, financial viability, and access

Recommendation 1:

As the majority of academic program overlap exists between Castleton and Northern Vermont University, charge a combined CU/NVU academic affairs group to develop clear evaluation criteria for review of duplicate and low-enrolled programs and a draft proposal for consolidation, increased investment, and/or closure.

This proposal should preserve student access to programs through consortium agreements, consolidation of programs to single majors, and telepresence/hybrid delivery models.

Work to be completed by October 1.



Charges: address duplication; ensure quality, financial viability, and access

Recommendation 2:

As CCV and Vermont Tech operations both serve large proportions of high school students and working adults across the state, charge CCV and VTC to review data and develop a plan for shared operations and opportunities to expand program offerings in co-located spaces.

Work to be completed by October 1.



Charges: address duplication; ensure quality, financial viability, and access

Recommendation 3:

Develop a single general education program core and make this available in person and online.

Recommendation 4:

Develop a plan to provide options for students to have flexible access to course offerings from all system institutions across the state. We recommend a structure that allows all students, including students in rural parts of the state, to take courses online or at telepresence locations.



Charges: Identify sustainable strategies for programs and provide student support in rural areas; strengthen focus on high-demand programs

Recommendation 5:

Engage an external consultant to review data (detailed costs and enrollments) and develop a proposal of most effective way to deliver residential experiences.

Some ideas received as input, discussed by Task Force:

- Prioritize greater collaboration and shared utilization of existing VSCS sites.
- Prioritize expansion in programming offered at high schools, CTEs, businesses, non-profits, health care agencies, etc. where it makes sense.
- Identify non-higher ed uses for some VSCS facilities (or parts) such as business incubators, mental health facilities, arts facilities, and other community uses.
- Explore opportunities for housing and hybrid continuation of academic programs in some VSCS locations without additional services (athletics, student life programming).



Charge: Reconfigure the system in organization, finance, governance, and accreditation.

Recommendation 6:

Conduct an in-depth analysis of the potential sustainability of moving to a new system configuration.

The Task Force recognizes that our recommendations and the results support an effort to transform the VSCS from its existing "federation of institutions" model to a true, interconnected system. We foresee a new system with a simplified accreditation and governance structure. More time and data is needed to make a recommendation for a new configuration model.



Affordability Theme & Ideas
